

The Minneapolis Bicycle Coalition (DBA Our Streets Minneapolis. exists to lobby for "streets that people first." They are clearly
lobbying. They are clearly lobbying Minneapolis and MN Pot and
Itennepin Avenue. Their own reporting shows 89,000 of their
\$ 500,000 budget went directly to lobbying. They are employing
people to lobby who are paid over \$3,000 a year. It would
appear they meet the definition of principals and lubbyists
and should be vegistered with the Campaign Finance Board and
doing required reporting.

Minnesota Statutes section 10A.022, subdivision 3, describes the procedures required for investigating complaints. A full description of the complaint process is available on the Board's website.

Briefly, the Board will notify you when it has received your complaint. The Board must send a copy of the complaint to the respondent. Complaints and investigations are confidential. Board members and staff cannot talk about an investigation except as required to carry out the investigation or to take action in the matter. After the Board issues a decision, the record of the investigation is public.


The law requires a complaint to go through two stages before the Board can begin an investigation: a prima facie determination and a probable cause decision. If the complaint does not pass one of the stages, it must be dismissed.

The Board has 10 business days after receiving your complaint to determine whether the complaint is sufficient to allege a prima facie violation of the campaign finance laws. If the Board determines that the complaint does allege a prima facie violation, the Board has 45 days to decide whether probable cause exists to believe a violation that warrants a formal investigation has occurred. Both you and the respondent have the right to be heard on the issue of probable cause before the Board makes this decision. The Board will notify you if the complaint moves to the probable cause stage.

If the Board determines that probable cause does not exist, the Board will dismiss the complaint. If the Board determines that probable cause exists, the Board will start an investigation. The Board will send you monthly updates regarding the status of the investigation. At the end of the investigation, the Board will offer you and the respondent the opportunity to be heard before the Board makes a final decision.

In most cases, the Board will issue findings, conclusions, and an order as its decision. For a spending or contribution limits violation, the Board can enter into a conciliation agreement with the respondent instead of issuing findings, conclusions, and an order. The Board's final decision will be sent to you and posted on the Board's website.



Our organization was founded in 2009 as the Minneapolis Bicycle Coalition. In 2017 we **changed our name** to Our Streets Minneapolis. With this change, we affirmed our commitment to people walking and rolling, not just people biking.

They clearly meet the definitions of lobbying.



What is lobbying?

Minnesota Campaign Finance and Public Disclosure Board

What is lobbying?

Lobbying is trying to influence governmental action by communicating with or urging others to communicate with public officials or local officials in metropolitan governmental units.

What is governmental action?

Governmental action means:

- (1) actions by the state legislature and by the governor in his role in the legislative process;
- (2) actions by state agencies, including boards and commissions, in rulemaking, rate setting, power plant and power line siting, and granting some certificates of need; and
- (3) official actions by metropolitan governmental units.

What is a metropolitan governmental unit?

A metropolitan governmental unit is any of the following:

- (1) the counties of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott, and Washington;
- (2) a regional railroad authority established by one or more of the counties listed in part (1);
- (3) a city with a population of over 50,000 located in one of the counties listed above, which includes Apple Valley, Blaine, Bloomington, Brooklyn Park, Burnsville, Coon Rapids, Eagan, Eden Prairie, Edina, Lakeville, Maple Grove, Minneapolis, Minnetonka, Plymouth, St. Paul, and Woodbury;
- (4) the Metropolitan Council; and
- (5) a metropolitan agency as defined in Minnesota Statutes section473.121, subdivision 5a, which includes the Metropolitan Airports Commission, the Metropolitan Parks and Open Space Commission, and the Metropolitan Sports Facilities Commission.

But the organization is not registered with the Campaign Finance Board.

Neither are any individuals.











Hennepin Ave S Reconstruction

Hennepin Ave S will be reconstructed in 2026. We're organizing to ensure that people biking, walking, and rolling are prioritized in the design.

UPDATE 5/27/22: Staff directive to save Hennepin Ave S bus lanes passes through committee. Next step: Full Council Vote

On December 7, 2021 the Minneapolis Public Works Department released their recommended layout for the Hennepin Avenue South reconstruction project from Lake Street to Douglas Avenue (construction will begin in 2024). The design includes car traffic lanes in both directions with additional dedicated left-turn lanes, full-time dedicated bus lanes, wider sidewalks, a protected bikeway, improved crosswalks, a planted center median, and more. This design would make Hennepin Avenue S comfortable and accessible for all users.

After months of delay, Public Works is finally bringing forward the final layout for approval by the Minneapolis City Council. Unfortunately the original plan has been changed and 24/7 bus lanes will no longer be included when the new street opens in 2026.

Public Works may claim that this layout is the same as the original plan, however that is not true. The current plan would delay the implementation of 24/7 bus lanes until an unspecified date in the future. There is no accountability and no reason to believe that this will happen anytime soon. This is unacceptable. These bus lanes are urgently needed for the thousands who depend on transit to access their daily needs. 24/7 bus lanes must be included on day 1 of the project's opening.

On May 19, the Public Works & Infrastructure (PWI) Committee passed a staff direction that would restore 24/7 bus lanes on day 1 of the Hennepin Avenue S reconstruction opening. The plan was brought to full City Council and then returned back to committee at the May 25th Council meeting. The layout will once again need to be amended to include 24/7 bus lanes at the June 9th PWI committee meeting.

June 9th UPDATE: The Minneapolis City Council Public Works and Infrastructure Committee passed a layout amendment to include 24/7 Bus Lanes on Day 1.

We are now calling on Ward 7 council member Lisa Goodman to join Ward 10 council member Aisha Chughtai to seek a 9 vote majority on June 16th to amend the Public Works Department recommended design and <u>RESTORE the original layout</u>, and we are calling on the entire Minneapolis City Council to support and vote for this amendment — <u>including all day 24/7</u> bus lanes on Day 1!





Help make Open Streets Minneapolis events more accessible for all

We have collaborated with the City of Minneapolis for over a decade to host Open Streets Minneapolis events. Open Streets Minneapolis events are some of the city's largest and most beloved events. These events are a canvas on which residents creatively showcase our city's incredible cultural diversity. Each route has local vendors, organizations, artists, and more. Beyond the fun, Open Streets Minneapolis is part of a global movement to make streets places that put people first.

Since the first Open Streets Minneapolis event in 2011 that was attended by an estimated 5,000 people, the program has grown to a peak attendance of 103,500 in 2019.

Since the first Open Streets Minneapolis event in 2011 that was attended by an estimated 5,000 people, the program has grown to a peak attendance of 103,500 in 2019.

As Open Streets Minneapolis, these events have continued to require more resources from our organization. As a small non-profit with a team of six, and just one person managing a majority of event planning & logistics, this is a growing concern for the future of Open Streets Minneapolis events. We historically have not received any compensation from the City of Minneapolis to cover the costs of organizing Open Streets Minneapolis. In 2022, the City of Minneapolis is proposing the creation of a new contract that seeks a contractor to organize future Open Streets Minneapolis events. The compensation provided through this contract is \$0 (City of Minneapolis Agreement).

The City's lack of monetary support is having a serious and continued impact on Our Streets Minneapolis's ability to organize Our Streets Minneapolis events sustainably and equitably.

Looming participation costs: To cover the cost of hosting the event, event participants pay a minimal fee for a spot at Open Streets Minneapolis events. While this fee is manageable for some, small businesses, nonprofits, and other event partners face significant barriers to entry. Receiving funding from the City would reduce the cost burden on participants.

You can see where they clearly state that they have a lobbying campaign to get funding for themselves and how people can take action.

Limited route selection: Due to capacity and funding constraints, Open Streets Minneapolis events are hosted on corridors that have the resources to support an event. This means that streets with lower incomes and areas along Minneapolis cultural corridors are left out of Open Streets Minneapolis activities. The business and communities in these areas deserve celebration. Funding from the City would allow us to increase the number of events we can host, specifically in lower income areas.


Open Streets Minneapolis is named as a priority in the recently adopted City of Minneapolis Transportation Action Plan. To ensure the current and future sustainability of the Open Streets Minneapolis initiative and to truly make it accessible and equitable for all city residents to enjoy,

we are asking the City of Minneapolis to monetarily invest in this program. We ask that the Mayor's 2023 budget include \$100,000 of ongoing funding to support Our Streets

Minneapolis in hosting these important community events. We are launching a public organizing campaign to support this goal, which we will continue until our needs are met. Read our letter to the City here.



UPDATE, 4/20/2022:

In response to public pressure, City of Minneapolis Public Works have worked internally to find ways to fund the program. In April, Our Streets Minneapolis staff and board members met with Public Works Director Margaret Anderson Kelliher and other Public Works staff. At the meeting, we were told that due to procurement constraints, no direct funding would be made available to Our Streets Minneapolis in 2022. However, Public Works committed to working with our staff to support the program in kind-to the tune of approximately \$20,000.

We thank Director Margaret Anderson Kelliher and her staff for their work to investigate and present us with these options. While these are a positive first step, the fact remains that the program still remains unfunded.

We will continue to organize for public funding to ensure the sustainability of the Open Streets program in perpetuity.






















Lobbying for bus lanes on Hennepin on Instagram

- The Bike Coalition (or Our Streets Minneapolis) is not registered as a lobbying group with the Campaign Finance Board. Neither does it have any individual lobbyists registered.
- This would appear to be a violation of the Campaign Finance rules.
