



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What is lobbying?

Lobbying is "trying to influence governmental action by communicating with or urging others to communicate with public officials or local officials in metropolitan governmental units."

Campaign Finance Board Lobbyist Handbook

Governmental action means:

- 1) legislative action, including action by the governor with regard to his role in the legislative process
- 2) administrative action
- 3) official action by a metropolitan governmental unit.

A metropolitan governmental unit means any of the following entities:

- the counties of Anoka; Carver; Dakota; Hennepin; Ramsey; Scott; and Washington;
- a regional rail authority established by one of the above counties;
- a city with a population over 50,000 located in one of the above counties;
- the Metropolitan Council; or
- the Metropolitan Parks and Open Space Commission, Metropolitan Airports Commission, and Metropolitan Sports Facilities Commission

Key requirements:

- Influence
- Legislative Action
- Minnesota: State, Large County, Large City
- Directly or by urging others to do so






Here are a few examples of the types of written feedback you might give. These are just samples—the most powerful reeoback you can give is telling your personal story and snanng your vision for Hennep Ave S.

Option 1 looks like the best way to create a Hennepin Ave that prioritizes sustainable transportation options that reduce congestion, increase shopping opportunities at local businesses and reduce greenhouse gas emissions to improve air quality and combat climate change - everything we want in a city with climate change looming.

Personally, I use Hennepin Avenue mostly to commute by transit to work in South Minneapolis. The transit lane has made my commute easier, late ous my bits and walk along Hennepin to visit local businesses. If 3 generate space for bicycle parking and amentites to make sure people are safe while walking and riding their bicycle along the street.

This effort generated over 44,000 letters to Minneapolis City Council Members, Hennepin County Board Members, and government staff.







For a decade, Our Streets Minneapolis, a local nonprofit, has collaborated with the City of For a decade, Our streets minineapons, a local insigning, has collaporate with the Lynd Minineapolis on the Open Streets Minineapolis initiative. Open Streets Minineapolis is part of a global movement to make streets places that put people first. Since the launch of the first Open Streets Minineapolis event in 2011 that was attended by an estimated 5,000 people, the program has grown to a peak attendance of 103,500 in 2019.

As Open Streets Minneapolis has grown, the events have continued to require more resources from Our Streets Minneapolis, the event organizer. The City's lack of monetary support is having a serious and continued impact on Our Streets Minneapolis's ability to organize Our Streets Minneapolis events sustainably and equitably. Specifically, small businesses and other event participants are faining higher barriers to entry to participate in these events. Higher entry fees disproportionately affect vendors of color, immigrants and those otherwise marginalized. Our Streets Minneapolis is also unable to increase the number of Open Streets Minneapolis events in neighborhoods with lower incomes and along Minneapolis cultural corridors due to cost constraints.

Transportation Action Plan. 
