Dear Appellate Court Judicial Candidate:

The forms and information enclosed in this packet are to assist you in meeting the requirements of Minnesota Statutes Chapter 10A, which governs campaign finance and disclosure for state-level offices in Minnesota. As a candidate for election, you will be required to meet various statutory requirements. Please review this letter and the enclosed disclosure calendar for information about registration requirements and reporting deadlines.

DO YOU NEED TO REGISTER A PRINCIPAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE WITH THE BOARD?

If you spend only your own money on your campaign, you are not required to register a principal campaign committee with the Board. A candidate who accepts contributions from others must register a committee within 14 days of the date on which the total value of contributions received from sources other than the candidate exceeds \$750. If you need to register a principal campaign committee the necessary form is included in this packet.

If you are not required to register a principal campaign committee but you spend more than \$750 (not including the filing fee to appear on the ballot) of your own money to influence your election you must still file Reports of Receipts and Expenditures that disclose your financial activity on behalf of your campaign. You may call the Board's office at 651-539-1188 or 800-657-3889 or email us at cfb.reports@state.mn.us and request that a report form be mailed or emailed to you. The reports are due June 14, 2024, July 29, 2024, September 24, 2024, and October 28, 2024.

UPCOMING CRITICAL DEADLINE:

• JUNE 14, 2024, REPORT OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES - If you register a campaign committee with the Board, or are required to report personal expenditures as explained above, you will need to file a report by June 14, 2024. This report covers the period of January 1, 2024 through May 31, 2024.

ECONOMIC INTEREST STATEMENT REQUIREMENT - A candidate elected to judicial office will be required to file an Economic Interest Statement with the Board within 60 days of assuming office. An Economic Interest Statement shows who employs the person completing the form, where the person owns non-homesteaded real property in Minnesota, the person's financial investments, and whether the person has any financial interests in horseracing. The Board puts information from the completed Economic Interest Statement on its website to make it easier for people to know when an elected official could have a conflict of interest. If you are elected to judicial office the Board will send you an Economic Interest Statement form to complete after you assume office.

ELECTRONIC FILING REQUIRED - All state-level candidates with a registered committee are required to file periodic Reports of Receipts and Expenditures electronically. The Board provides at no charge the Campaign Finance Reporter Online (CFRO) application for filing the reports electronically. The treasurer will receive a username and password in the mail after the principal campaign committee is registered with the Board.

CANDIDATE / TREASURER TRAINING - Staff periodically provides online training sessions. Check the calendar of upcoming training sessions on the Board's website at: train.cfb.mn.gov/training/. The Board has produced a candidate handbook that is a great reference for treasurers and first-time candidates, which is available at: cfb.mn.gov/filer-resources/self-help/handbooks/candidates.

Additionally, there is a recorded compliance training video and a recorded CFRO training video available at: cfb.mn.gov/filer-resources/self-help/education-and-tools/online-videos/. Any person who signs and certifies to be true a report or statement which the person knows contains false information, or who knowingly omits required information, is subject to a civil penalty imposed by the Board of up to \$3,000 and is subject to criminal prosecution for a gross misdemeanor.

2023 – 2024 ELECTION CYCLE SEGMENT CONTRIBUTION LIMITS

All contribution limits apply to the total of cash contributions, in-kind contributions, and loans received during the two-year period from January 1, 2023, through December 31, 2024.

Individual and Candidate Contribution Limits. Applies to the aggregate of contributions received during 2023 and 2024 from an individual, political committee, or a political fund (excluding political party units), unregistered associations, and from the candidate's personal funds.

Aggregate Political Party Unit and Terminating Principal Campaign Committee Contribution Limits. Applies to the aggregate of contributions received during 2023 and 2024 from all political party units and terminating principal campaign committees. Party units include a party caucus in the legislature, a state party, and party units in legislative districts, congressional districts, counties, municipalities, and precincts in aggregate.

Aggregate contribution limits. All candidates (except judicial candidates) are subject to an aggregate contribution limit. This limit is not dependent on the signing of a public subsidy agreement. The aggregate contribution limit does not increase for first-time candidates or for candidates who do not sign a public subsidy agreement. This limit applies to the aggregate of all contributions and loans from lobbyists, political committees or political funds, and associations not registered with the Board.

Spending limit. The spending limit includes the total of:

- 1. Monetary campaign expenditures,
- 2. In-kind campaign expenditures, and
- 3. Unpaid campaign expenditures.

Election Cycle Segments. The spending limit is higher in a two-year segment during which an election is held for the office sought.

First-Time Candidate. A candidate is eligible for a 10% increase in the base campaign expenditure limit if the following conditions are met:

- 1. The candidate has not previously held the same office. For the legislature the office is House of Representatives or State Senate, without regard to any specific district.
- 2. The candidate has not previously been on the primary or general election ballot for that office.
- 3. The candidate has not in the past 10 years raised or spent more than \$750 in a run for any other office whose territory now includes a population that is more than one-third of the population in the territory of the office the candidate is now seeking.

Closely Contested Primary election. A candidate is eligible for a 20% spending limit increase for having a closely contested primary election if the following conditions are met:

- 1. The candidate won the primary election, and had at least one opponent in the primary election,
- 2. The candidate received fewer than twice as many votes as any one of the opponents in the primary. The closely contested primary spending limit increase is available for use only after the primary election.

appellate courts whose seat will be on the ballot in 2024. After that date, appellate candidates who did not file an affidavit of candidacy to be on the 2024 ballot should follow the calendar

for candidates not running for office.

February 1 \$25 per day late filing fee begins for failure to file the year-end report of receipts and

expenditures.

March 31 Last day of transactions included in the first report of receipts and expenditures.

April 15 First report of receipts and expenditures due. Period covered: 1/1/2024 through

3/31/2024.

April 16 \$25 per day late filing fee begins for failure to file the first report of receipts and

expenditures.

May 21 Candidate filing period opens to run for office. Judicial candidates do not have to file a

statement of economic interest until after taking the oath of office.

May 31 Last day of transactions included in the second report of receipts and expenditures.

June 4 Last day for candidates to file to run for office.

June 14 Second report of receipts and expenditures due. Period covered: 1/1/2024 through

5/31/2024.

June 17 \$25 per day late filing fee begins for failure to file the second report of receipts and

expenditures.

July 22 Last day of transactions included in the third report of receipts and expenditures.

July 23 through

August 12

24 Hour Reporting of Large Contributions – Pre-primary-election

Contributions and loans from any one source totaling more than \$2,000 for appellate court candidates must be reported to the Board electronically or in person by 4:30 p.m. on the next business day after receipt and also on subsequent reports of receipts and expenditures for the year. Failure to file the notice on time will result in a \$50 per day late filing fee. **Note:** Candidates who are unopposed at the primary election do not need to report large contributions during this period.

July 29 Third report of receipts and expenditures due - Pre-primary. Period covered: 1/1/2024 through 7/22/2024. July 30 \$50 per day late filing fee begins for failure to file the third report of receipts and expenditures. August 13 PRIMARY ELECTION September 17 Last day of transactions included in the fourth report of receipts and expenditures. September 24 Fourth report of receipts and expenditures due. Period covered: 1/1/2024 through 9/17/2024. Note: Candidates who lost the primary election do not need to file this report. September 25 \$25 per day late filing fee begins for failure to file the fourth report of receipts and expenditures. October 21 Last day of transactions included in the fifth report of receipts and expenditures. October 22 24 Hour Reporting of Large Contributions – Pre-general-election through Contributions and loans from any one source totaling more than \$2,000 for appellate court November 4 candidates must be reported to the Board electronically or in person by 4:30 p.m. on the next business day after receipt and also on subsequent reports of receipts and expenditures for the year. Failure to file the notice on time will result in a \$50 per day late filing fee. Note: Candidates who lost the primary election do not need to report large contributions during this period. October 28 Fifth report of receipts and expenditures due – Pre-general. Period covered: 1/1/2024 through 10/21/2024. Note: Candidates who lost the primary election do not need to file this report. October 29 \$50 per day late filing fee begins for failure to file the fifth report of receipts and expenditures. November 5 **GENERAL ELECTION** 2025 January 31 2024 year-end report of receipts and expenditures due. Period covered: 1/1/2024 through 12/31/2024. February 3 \$25 per day late filing fee begins for failure to file the year-end report of receipts and expenditures.
